The story of Purim is not really a kid friendly text, although we make it so. Who doesn't like two queens, a beauty pageant, a costume ball, lots of parties, and good triumphing over evil, with special edible treats at the end. It reads like a fairy tale. Or at least an

While researching the holiday, I discovered Purim Is not your typical Torah/Bible era story. To begin with, Hashem is not mentioned at all in the story. There are no miracles sent to save us. This is truly a story of people saving themselves.

Secondly, the story features not just one, but two strong women. Vashti could have done Ahasuerus's bidding and saved herself from banishment or beheading (depending on the version). But instead she advocated for herself. She was not to be ordered about at the whim of her husband, no matter how powerful he was.

Esther, our hero, also could have saved herself without disclosing her faith. Mordecai believed in Esther and helped nurture the courage inside of her. Esther took a different approach with the king than the one Vashti had. Over two nights she won him over with food and attention. When it was time to reveal Haman's wicked decree, Ahasuerus was fully behind his queen and did as she requested. Haman never

allegory. I often say I don't know why Disney hasn't done this story.

But there is an underside to the story. Too much drinking. Too much quest for power. Too much sex, Too much violence. Too much revenge. It is all in there. It is a story that seems ripped from the headlines. Today's headlines.

And perhaps that is why it is important. In Judaism's darkest days, the story of the Book of Esther brings us hope. We survived. We will survive. We will continue to survive. So, grab a gragger, (Or make one!) Don a costume. Pretend to be some

thing you are not, or something you want to be. Hear the words of the Megillah. Drown out Haman's name. Join us for some games. Eat a hamantaschen. (Order some from the Torah



School!) Share some with friends. After all, it's Adar. We are allowed to have a little fun, even if we are not feeling it. We have survived. For 5784 years. May it continue to be so.



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Founding of Hadassah, Its Mission, and Shabbat Zachor

HADASSAH An organization that began as a small mission to provide emergency care in pre-state Israel and a women's study group in New York City has flourished over a century into a worldwide organization.

Hadassah Founding Our story begins with the extraordinary Henrietta Szold. On a trip to pre-state



Israel, Henrietta Szold's view of the world changed. Horrified by the impact starvation and disease had on her people, she took action. On February 24, 1912, 38 women

constituted the Hadassah Chapter of Daughters of Zion, elected Henrietta Szold as president, and chose nursing as their focus. The new organization's first act was to collect money and send two nurses to Palestine in 1913 to provide pasteurized milk to infants and new mothers and to eradicate trachoma. In 1914, the name was changed to Hadassah, The Women's Zionist Organization of America. Henrietta called for practical Zionism, proactive work to bring healing to

Palestine's people. Their original mission was *Aruhat Bat Ami*: the Healing of the Daughter of My People. More than 100 years later, we are proud to advance Henrietta's legacy. We empower women to put their values into action. We continue to build a strong community in the US and Israel. And, in 2005, Hadassah Medical Organization earned a Nobel Peace Prize nomination for bringing advanced medical care to all, regardless of race, ethnicity or nationality, in essence creating a bridge to peace through medicine.

Continuing Our Mission Today we're 300,000 strong with Members, male Associates, and supporters from across the nation. We remain committed to building a better world through medicine and health care, advocating for change including for women's equality, and supporting Israel while promoting a strong US -Israel relationship. When a sculptor was creating a bust of Henrietta Szold, our founder, she asked him to "make my eyes look to the future." Henrietta Szold is a testament to what one person, one organization, and one vision can accomplish — and we continue to advance her legacy and

lifesaving work today.

Shabbat Zachor On the Shabbat before Purim, the holiday on which we celebrate the foiling of Haman the Amalekite's plot to destroy the Jewish people, the weekly Torah reading is supplemented with the Zachor ("Remember!") reading (Deuteronomy 25:17-19), in which we are commanded to remember the evil of Amalek and to eradicate it from the face of the earth. It was in 1912, just a week before Purim, that Hadassah was created. The name was taken from the Hebrew name of the heroine of the Purim story, Queen Esther! When one considers that all of the Jewish people who were alive at the time lived in the Persian Empire, she literally saved all of her people from extinction. On Hadassah Shabbat, March 22 and March 23 this year, there is a lot of pride to share, with the hope that it will inspire not only our synagogue communities, but the larger community, as well. The Shabbat before Purim is called Shabbat Zachor—Remember!



Purim of Today

I can't believe we are already in March 2024, and I have humble gratitude for the life I have. We all live with challenges and sometimes lose sight of the daily miracles. The first prayer we say in the morning is Modeh Ani: "I am grateful to You, living, enduring Sovereign, for restoring my soul to me in compassion. You are faithful beyond measure." We hear every day that someone is unable to see another sunrise, their



family, and friends. It is a daily event that for the most part is taken for granted.

Purim is the plural for *Pur* – lots. One of the many definitions for "casting lots" in a biblical sense is making a chance decision by throwing straw or pebbles. This is how the 14th of Adar was chosen to annihilate the Jewish people. Thankfully a few individuals led and created a different outcome. The Shabbat before Purim is called *Shabbat Zachor* - remember. A fundamental part of Judaism is the retelling of our ancestors' stories – to discuss and learn, with the goal of bettering our future.

Life is full of an unfathomable amount of events that shape us into who we become. What is your lot in life? Can we change the outcome? Maybe. Do we have a better chance of a different destiny if we accept help from others? Definitely. To know your past is a vital tool to change your lot in life, but it is not a guarantee.

The past few years we have seen so much pain in our world. Many of us were affected directly, as our foundations were shaken and/or taken away. How has this affected your approach to living life and creating your lot?

Yahrzeits Page 1

We recall with loving memory those whose yahrzeits are commemorated during the coming weeks, and those whose names are read in the synagogue at Friday evening and Saturday morning Shabbat services during March. It is appropriate for members of their families to be present when these names are read.

This Jewish leap year we have both Adar 1 and Adar 2. Adding a second Adar, however, makes people who have a yahrzeit during Adar confused. When should they say Kaddish? When should they light a candle? The truth is that there are several acceptable answers to that. Some say you say it in both Adar 1 and Adar 2. Some say you should say it only in Adar 1, and some say only in Adar 2 if the death was in a year that had an Adar 2. There is no absolute right or wrong way to do this. And how we mark yahrzeit dates at CKI may not line up 100% with a notice you receive from a funeral home. If you have questions about an Adar yahrzeit, please call the rabbi.

SELLING OF CHAMETZ 2024/5784

In traditional Jewish law, we are not allowed to possess chametz, leavened bread or leavening agents, during Passover. Some families have the tradition of changing over their dishes and really scrubbing down the whole house. Think about spring cleaning on steroids. However, not owning chametz could put many families at an economic disadvantage. Therefore, the rabbis found a work-around. Any chametz left undisposed of could be sold to someone not Jewish then repurchased after the holiday.

At Congregation Kneseth Israel, we do precisely that. I, as the Rabbi, act as our agent to carry out this complicated piece of Jewish and civil law. If you would like to participate in this ancient tradition, I will sell our chametz to Deacon Andrea Delany at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church all of our chametz, in our houses, cars, businesses, and the synagogue. I will then buy it back from Deacon within two hours of sundown after the 8th day of Passover. As part of the sale, monies collected in the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund for this purpose are donated in CKI's name to the Elgin Cooperative Ministries, Community Crisis Center, Mazon, and Ma'ot Chitim of Chicago. This helps us build bridges in the community and "love our neighbors as ourselves." Now, more than ever, these organizations need our help as they provide for the most vulnerable amongst us. "Let all who are hungry come and eat."
