From the Rabbi's Study...

January 1 - Happy New Year. While I am not so big on New Year's Resolutions, it is often a

good day to watch football, go for a run, curl up with a good book, or work on a puzzle. It can seem like a reset button. It is almost half way through the year from Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year. Where do we want to be? Where are we going?

Often I hear the statement, usually from wedding couples, "We are spiritual, not religious."These sentiments are backed up by the most recent Pew Study. Americans are spiritual and believe in G-d, but don't often participate in organized religion.

As I said in a recent "From the Rabbi's Study:" "Recently I have been thinking a lot about our vision statement that says "Meaningful Observance."The word meaningful is hard to define. What is meaningful to you, may not be to your children, or your neighbor, or to me, or visa versa. The confirmation class worked on a definition, and the online dictionaries say that it is about deriving meaning. In high school, our English teachers would not have been happy using the word to define the word.

Then I went to a JUF sponsored seminar on the Changing Paradigms of Jewish Education. It was fascinating, and it was about educating not for knowledge (with Rav Google, kids can look up any fact) but for meaning. Next, I hosted an AAUW panel on Being Jewish and Female. There was a discussion of spirituality as part of that panel. Is Judaism spiritual? Does spirituality differ if you are Jewish? If you're a woman? The answers surprised me.

Spirituality is another word that is difficult to define. I went back to my confirmation class for a robust discussion. Out of that, they have created a Survey Monkey looking for your opinion on spirituality. It is their first attempt at creating a survey. There are no right or wrong answers. Click on this link:

Consider even letting your 4-8th graders try it. It is one of the ways to change the paradigm of Jewish education.

However, it seems that spirituality is the goal of Judaism. Trying to connect with the Divine, with something beyond yourself. Finding meaning, in observance, in your job, your family, your hobbies, your friends. In life itself, it is what Judaism is designed to help you do. Even though many of us didn't love the last Book Club book, The Frozen Rabbi, I was intrigued about how Jewish spirituality, even Jewish mysticism, were sprinkled throughout the book. Reading (and education) is one way to find meaning. In these winter months, pick up a Jewish book and be transported.

Each of us may put those pieces together in different ways. That is the puzzle. I invite you to join the discussion. Starting January 13, there will be two new adult study offerings. The first will be "On Finding Meaning". The second will be a beginning alef-bet Hebrew Class. Both will happen at 11:00AM. Please RSVP so we have enough materials.

Another way to find meaning is through prayer and services. Some find that meaning through the music and the singing. Others through the ancient words. Still others through the reading of the *Torah* or the *Torah* discussion. One way is certainly through our High Holiday choir and our own MishMosh group. We will be honoring the choir with a very special Kabbalat Shabbat service on January 18, which is also Shabbat Shira, the Sabbath of Song.

That weekend is also Martin Luther King, Jr weekend and once again we will be participating in the City of Elgin Martin Luther King food drive. Beginning January 1 (or 2), remember to bring your non-perishable food donations, or your checks made out to Food for Greater Elgin. One way we bring meaning to our lives is by taking care of the most vulnerable among us.

For the last few months we have concentrated on the core values or principles of Judaism with an eye toward figuring out what it means to be a "kehila kedosha", a holy community. At that conference on the Changing Paradigms of Jewish Education, we were given a bulletin board. It is now in our entrance way, begging the question, "How will you piece together your most meaningful life?"

On Shavuot, the day we celebrate receiving the ten commandments at Sinai—June 8 and 9 this year—we will complete that study. And then, probably, we will begin it again.

Principles of Covenant:

Since the last HaKol, we as a community have had the sad and necessary opportunity to live out one core Jewish value, "to bury the dead and comfort the bereaved." Some days, it is almost an impossible task. Our sacred texts give us some ideas of how to do it. There is a rhythm to grief. That first week, what we call shiva, based on the Hebrew word for seven, is almost

incomprehensible, painful beyond words. That's when we are really good at helping a family plan a funeral, bringing meals and snacks to a shiva house, showing up for shiva minyans. Then, when the family "gets up again," it is traditional to take a walk around the block. That is a reset button, too. The mourning continues either for 30 days (shloshim) and, to some extent, a full eleven months for a parent.

Sometimes I hear things, as the rabbi, that are hard to explain—"I don't have to do to shiva because I didn't know the person who died." Or, "I don't know the family." I would encourage you to show up anyway. Or, "He's just at the shiva for the free food." I don't think that has ever happened. Or, "We should be out of the lifecycle business." No. Making Jewish lifecycle events, Jewish milestones, including burial, is

precisely the business we, as a synagogue, are in. However, it is true that sometimes comforting the bereaved is really difficult.

Haftarah: Isaiah 6:1-7:6; 9:5-6

Here are some helpful guidelines:

20 Shevat

- Just show up. The funeral. The burial. The shiva.
- You don't need to say anything. Wait for the mourner to talk to you. Don't rush in to fill the empty space. Try to avoid "platitudes", things like, "He's in a better place now. G-d needed another angel. G-d never gives you more than you can bear." Listen. Listen deeply. Or share a story you remember of the person.
- · Offer to bring something or to help clean up. Karen and Al Bender often coordinate our shiva observances.
- Come for the *minyan*. Enabling the mourners to say Kaddish is comforting.
- · Consider a donation. To CKI or to a charity that was meaningful to the family.
- Don't disappear after the shiva. That first year, all the firsts, a birthday, a special holiday, an anniversary can be hard. The second year can be even harder. Go out for lunch. Have coffee. Call. Write a note, an email, a text.
- · If you want to learn more, I encourage you to check out this resource: https://www.shiva.com/learning-center/visiting -shiva/ We are, after all, life long learners.



Families of IDF Soldiers Injured in Terrorist Attacks offer thanks to Hadassah Hospital

Three families with children serving in the Israel Defense Forces have much to be thankful for this holiday season.

Injured last Friday, while serving in the Netzach Yehuda (Nachal Haredi) army brigade, Naveh Rotem, 22, was bashed in the head with a large boulder by a terrorist. Rushed to Hadassah Hospital, Naveh underwent one surgery with two surgical teams: the neurosurgery team and the oral and maxillofacial surgery (OMS) team. Naveh underwent three surgeries with both the neurosurgery and OMS teams. Most thankful for his recovery are Naveh's family, which includes his wife, 5-month-old baby, and his parents.

"We were so lucky to come to Hadassah with such professional treatment," said Naveh's father, Mutti Rotem. The couple are spending Shabbat with his parents.

Naveh's wife, Gal, is a second-year student in at the Hebrew University-Hadassah School of Occupational Therapy. "I know about Hadassah," she said. "In our first week of school we learned how as early as 1947 the first occupational therapy course was established in the Hadassah Nursing School on Mount Scopus, with a class of 20 participants. Please thank them for this amazing hospital. The neurosurgeons saved my husband, and the whole staff is so caring and professional.

Having a private room in the Davidson Tower made a huge difference for us to be together with Naveh."

Gal recalls hearing on the radio that there was a terror attack in Beit El, where Naveh was serving, and was relieved that no one called her. Then her mother-in-law, Osnat, called and

said she was coming over and would be there in ten minutes. "They were the longest ten minutes of my life," she said. Two soldiers were with her mother-in-law and told her that Naveh was seriously wounded. "They had come to my house, but I was busy with the baby and didn't hear the doorbell. I thought, 'at least he's alive. It was very hard to see him with his terrible head injury." Naveh will be back in the hospital next week for continued treatment. He has many facial wounds and will need plastic surgery and maxiofacial surgery.

Nathaniel Felber, 20, was also serving in the Netzach Yehuda IDF unit when he was injured last Thursday while guarding a bus stop. Nathaniel was shot by terrorists in Givat Assaf, near Ramallah. His parents Judi Abramson Felber and her husband Joe Felber together with their extended families, gathered on the 12th-floor healing garden close to their very seriously wounded soldier son. Nathaniel has been transferred from the surgical intensive care unit to the neuro intensive care unit.

Nathaniel underwent a complicated surgery on the right side of his head. Still seriously injured


— in life-threatening condition — his mother Judi offered thanks to Hadassah for providing her family comfort during this time.

"Please tell Hadassah supporters that we can't thank them enough for the excellent care and loving, family-like embrace in the hospital. We appreciate the high level of medicine, and the thought that went into everything, even building a tower with healing gardens with benches for the families. I want to thank you all for your interest in these difficult times and ask you to continue praying for Nathaniel's healing—Nathaniel Ilan Ben Sheyna Tzippora—and supporting Hadassah Hospital's incredible staff."

Liza Nataf, 19, a border policewoman was injured in the terror attack at Damascus Gate. A lone soldier from France, she was transferred to the orthopedics department at Mount Scopus and was treated by knee expert Dr. Adi Fridman. Liza's mother visiting from France for Hanukkah and was able to be with her daughter in the hospital.

Nataf has been released and is home recovering.
