

The celebration continues. Sukkot is referred to as "Zeman Simchateinu. the time of our joy." We have much to be joyful about. Traditionally, Sukkot was a pilgrimage holiday where the Israelites would go up to Jerusalem and present offerings in honor of the harvest. We, too, are joyful for our harvest. The community garden has fed many people this year. There has been a bumper crop of cherry tomatoes, cucumbers, zucchini, and more. Holy Trinity and our neighbors are grateful. We have the chance to continue our gratefulness with the CROP Walk on October 15<sup>th</sup>. Peg Lehman will be walking, as will Simon and I (and maybe Caleb). It is a great afternoon of gratefulness, beautiful fall colors, and a chance to celebrate our wider community, while supporting ECM and the Soup Kettles.

The Men's Club ensures that the Sukkah goes up (and back down), and they also have the opportunity to celebrate together with Scotch (and Beer) and Hot Dogs in the Hut. We thank them. The Torah School students also get to enjoy Pizza in the Hut. We celebrate our children in many ways in October. Chai Babies is starting once-a-month family Shabbat services at 5:30. You'll be done by 6:30, in time for most young kids' bedtimes. We are excited to bring back this program. Called *Family First Fridays*, the first one is Friday, October 6.

Sukkot and the whole holy day season finish up with Simchat Torah. Our congregation will be celebrating on October 8 at 9:00 AM. We will be joined by Sofer Neil Yerman and Rabbi Charlie Rubovits who will be returning two Torahs to us. We will also be joined by members of MCJC as we dance with all eight Torahs, unfurl one, and welcome more people to our building. We will honor our newest Torah School students with a special blessing. Unfurling the Torah takes the whole community as we stand together holding it open. The cycle begins again.

However, sometimes it is difficult to feel the joy. Kohelet, (Ecclessiates), which may have been written by Solomon in his old age, struggled with this too. We read this short book on Sukkot, perhaps to dampen our joy. He thought that everything was futile. Towards the end he says, "It is better to go to a house of mourning than to a house of feasting; for that is the end of every man, and a living one should take it to heart." Sadly, ours is a congregation that has experienced many deaths this year already. We have been able to help people mourn in ways that are meaningful to them. It is about meeting people where they are, even in their grief. Keep watching those emails.

One agency I support fully is Fox Valley Hands of Hope. They offer free grief counseling services for anyone in the Fox River Valley. On Oct. 14<sup>th</sup> they are hosting an art auction at their newly renovated offices in Geneva featuring local artists on the theme of light and darkness. There may be one of my paintings of a full moon over the ocean in this juried show. Tickets may still be available.

Psalm 30 tells us, "Tears may linger for a night, but joy comes in the morning." This too is part of what we provide at CKI. Slowly, over time. There is much going on at CKI.

As I often say when I welcome guests to CKI and give them a tour of the building, "Welcome to my other home."

#### Hadassah Doctors Treat Rare Condition in Newborn That Saves Her Ovaries

#### August 7, 2023

In what is considered a medical first, doctors at Hadassah Hospital Ein Kerem saved a baby's ovaries by performing surgery a half-hour after her birth by cesarean section, something never done before on a newborn.



When Tamar Levy's ultrasound at 35 weeks showed an abnormality in her fetus's abdomen, her gynecologist sent her

immediately to the Emergency Room at Hadassah Ein Kerem.

There, an ultrasound machine that had been upgraded just weeks before detected that cysts on both of the fetus's ovaries were twisting them, resulting in a slowing of the blood flow to the ovaries.

This condition, called ovarian torsion, is more commonly seen in teenagers and adults. Left untreated it is very painful and results in the



loss of the ovary. Rarely does a cyst occur in both ovaries, as in the case of the fetus.

Working quickly, Dr. Dan Arbel, director of Hadassah's Pediatric Oncology Surgery Unit, and Dr. Noa Ofek Shlomai, director of the Premature and Neonatal Unit, delivered the baby and within 30 minutes performed the delicate

> surgery that restored normal blood flow to the baby's ovaries.

Said Levy, "I thank everyone who took care of me along the way, and for the wonderful and quick work done by the staff at the hospital in order to take care of our daughter."

#### Hadassah 's Experimental Multiple Myeloma Treatment

In an unprecedented achievement, the Hadassah Medical Organization (HMO) saw a 90 percent success rate for its innovative experimental treatment for the bone marrow cancer multiple myeloma.

This treatment uses genetic engineering technology called CAR-T, or chimeric antigen receptor T-cell therapy, which boosts the patient's immune system to destroy the cancer.

Multiple myeloma has long been considered incurable, with an average life expectancy for patients after diagnosis of only two years. "Now, in light of the impressive results of CAR-T treatments, it seems that they have many more years to live—and with an excellent quality of life," says Prof. Polina Stepensky, head of HMO's Department of Bone Marrow Transplantation and Cancer Immunotherapy for Adults and Children, in an article in *The Jerusalem Post.* 

More than 90 percent of the 74 patients treated at Hadassah went into complete remission. The treatment was developed and produced by Hadassah in collaboration with Bar-Ilan University in Ramat Gan.

"As the first and only institution in Israel that

develops, manufactures, and delivers CAR-T treatment, Hadassah is actually leading the field that will enable the development of future treatments with CAR-T cells for the benefit of patients with other types of cancer," says Stepensky.

# **Ritually Speaking**

#### Jewish Customs—Mezuzah

In 5784 I hope you find my articles to be educational. I will be returning (*teshuvah*) to the basic explanations of Jewish customs that we have had for a very long time. This article will be about

the mezuzah, the mark of a Jewish home.

**MEZUZAH**: in Hebrew means doorpost.

**PARCHMENT:** the scroll (Klaf) on which two phrases are written; referred to as a mezuzah after it has been attached to its permanent location.

Passage one: Deut 6: 4-9 ("Shema" & "V'ahavta")

Passage two: Deut 11: 13-21 (second paragraph of Shema in between V'ahavta and Vayomer).

**PLACEMENT**: Custom to have at each entrance to building.

Some follow the custom of every room in the house, even if

you have a courtyard/fenced in area.

Bathroom, bath houses, and outhouses are exempt from this commandment.

SUKKAH is a temporary dwelling and does not meet the requirements for attaching a mezuzah.

**HOME**: Customary to attach a mezuzah as soon as possible, but if it is a rental home and the landlord will allow, you have a 30-day window to affix the mezuzah.

**MOVING:** When you move out and the next occupant is Jewish, you may leave it. If they are not, you should remove it, since it is a sacred object, due to what is contained on the inside.

**LUCKY CHARM--NO!** The mitzvah is to teach us the Oneness of G-d, and that we stay humble and reverent not only within our homes but also when we are in the outside world.

#### **MOUNTING:**

The usual location for it to be mounted is on the right side of the door as you enter the house or room.

Height is traditionally two-thirds of the way up from the floor.

I interpret the commandment to have no age limit, and I like to have one located for our children to reach and participate with this mitzvah at an early age.

If the doorpost is too narrow for slanting it, then it is permissible to attach vertically.

#### Now to address the big question -2 Jews, 3 opinions?

Sephardic tradition is for the mezuzah to be affixed vertically. Rashi taught this mounting as it should be directing our attention to our G-d in the heaven in our comings and goings.

Rabbeinu Tam (Rashi's grandson) taught that the mezuzah should be placed horizontally, referencing to how the torahs/scrolls were placed in the temple.

Ashkenazic tradition has been teaching the mezuzah being attached at the angle—a compromise that Rabbi Jakob Ben Asher (14<sup>th</sup> century) taught, which shows respect to both teachings.
